
Brockway Memorial Library Annual Report 2024-2025

This year's annual theme from the Florida Library Association, "Overdue for Fun," encourages us to revisit professional foundations, reflect on our successes, tell our stories, become involved, and mentor and build relationships throughout our library community.

This past year, the Library, now a locally registered historic landmark, entered its 76th year of service to the Miami Shores community. In keeping with tradition, Library staff maintained its focus on meaningful collection development, stellar programming, and strong community outreach.

Partnerships with the Chamber of Commerce, the Village's downtown businesses, schools, and local organizations brought the best in offerings to our patrons of all ages. Connections made with neighboring cities did the same, as seen in the numerous programs offered in connection to history and historic preservation.

Following this momentum, Village Archivist, John Bachay, began the Miami Shores Village Oral History Project, recording interviews with several locals, many of whom have connections to the Village's founders. An ongoing project being prioritized as the Village nears its centennial year, three histories have been collected thus far, one with the son of Edwin Reeder, the Library's original architect, a second with Milton Dillon, grandson of Roy Hawkins, then Vice President of Bessemer Properties who was instrumental

in persuading the Florida Legislature to incorporate

Miami Shores Village in 1932, and a third with Anne Paulk and Gerald W. Moore, relatives of T.V. Moore, the "Pineapple King," who once farmed 150 acres of local land, including what is today the Shores downtown business district.

With the incredible demand and growth the Library has experienced in Youth Services over the last decade, it was deemed imperative to add staffing to this area. Our new Youth Services Assistant will be present during the busiest hours of youth

Perhaps one of the most impactful initiatives that kicked off this year was that of the Village StoryWalk® at Optimist Park. With a grand opening last September featuring the book, *A Tree is Nice*, by Janice May Udry, the Library has offered three books to date. Additional titles featured have been, *Sing a Season Song* by Jane Yolen and *What a Wonderful World*, based on Louis Armstrong's classic, illustrated by Tim Hopgood.
