### MIAMI SHORES VILLAGE INAUGURAL JUNETEENTH CELEBRATION

On Saturday, June 17th, South Florida People of Color (SFPoC), Miami Shores Elementary School (MSES), and Brockway Memorial Library collaborated to celebrate the emancipation of enslaved people in the United States, known as Juneteenth. The festivities included drumming, a keynote address by historian and author Dr. Tameka Hobbs, and the Miami Shores Elementary cheerleaders introducing dance, poetry, and rap recitations by students in the fifth grade class. These performances were followed by an art exhibit on the Library's main floor which showcased Juneteenth artwork by MSES students and a southern soul food feast provided by Gals On Da Run. Among the attendees were former Mayor Sandra Harris and Councilmember Jerome Charles and Jesse Valinsky. We wish to recognize Principal Diaz, Assistant Principal Miller, Art teacher Ms. Rhonda Daytz, Cheer Coordinators, Ms. Morrow and Ms. Martinez, Dance Coordinator Gio Smith, and School Counselor Lorna Reggler-Sinclair for their combined efforts to prepare such a meaningful and moving program with the kids. The second regular Village Council Meeting will begin at 6:30 PM or immediately following the Budget Workshop at 9900 NE 2nd Avenue

Miami Shores Village complies with the provisions of the Americans with Disability Act. In accordance with Village Code and section 2-11.1(s) of the Miami-Dade County Code, any person engaging in lobbying activities, as defined therein, must register at the Village Clerk's Office before addressing the Council.

### **June 2023 Council Action Notes:**

- Approved a resolution, authorizing the Village Manager to execute agreements with Ceres Environmental Services, Inc. as the primary contractor, DRC Emergency Services, LLC as the secondary contractor and T.F.R. Enterprises as the tertiary contractor, to provide disaster debris removal and disposal services.
- Approved an interlocal agreement between Miami Shores Village, by and through its police department, and Miami-Dade County to allow the Village, pursuant to section 8CC-11 of the Miami-Dade County Code of Ordinances, to enforce various provisions of the County Code and issue civil violation notices.
- Approved a resolution, authorizing the Village Manager to execute the turf and landscape maintenance department funded contract renewal between the Florida Department of Transportation and Miami Shores Village.
- Approved a resolution, creating an Ad Hoc Traffic Advisory Committee and establishing the scope of review and composition.
- Directed the Village Attorneys to draft a resolution, based on individual Councilmember input and best practices, repealing and replacing the existing Rules of Procedures affecting Village Council proceedings.
- Adopted an ordinance, re-instituting the moratorium on the acceptance, review and consideration of applications for rezoning and/future land use map amendments for an additional six (6) months or upon final approval of the proposed comprehensive plan amendments through the required appeal period, whichever is earlier.
- Adopted an ordinance, amending the Village's Code of Ordinances by amending chapter 2, "administration," and creating section 2-1, "Official Seal," to adopt the Village Seal.

- Adopted an ordinance, amending Appendix, A, "Zoning," section 906, "Issuance Of Development Orders" to include prerequisites for development activity and issuance of development permits in accordance with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System ("NPDES") PERMIT NO. FLS000003.
- Adopted an ordinance, comprehensively updating and amending Chapter 20, "Streets, Sidewalks and Other Public Places," Article V., "Stormwater Utility" by adding Division I, "Stormwater Utility System" and creating Division II, "Stormwater Quality," pertaining to illicit discharges and connections, erosion and sediment water quality regulations.
- Appointed Puja Motiani to the Library Board of Trustees.
- Appointed Alice Burch, Sunja Leon, Karen Smith-Gulaskey, and Christian Ulvert to the Doctors Charter School Board.
- Approved a resolution, designating 1115 NE 97th Street as a Village Historic Landmark.
- Approved a resolution, designating 10021 NE 2nd Avenue (Brockway Memorial Library) as a Village Historic Landmark.
- Directed the Village Manager to proceed with Bayfront Park Seawall Replacement Project notwithstanding the outcome of the FIND grant application, which is still under review.
- Directed the Village Manager and Village Attorneys to proceed with the next phase of the uniform method of collection for the Shores Estates Septic to Sewer Conversion Project.
- Established the Pre-Budget Workshop date (Wednesday, June 28) and Budget Workshop date (Thursday, July 20, 2023). Both workshops will be held at the 9900 Building, beginning at 6PM.
- Amended the date of the second regular Village Council Meeting date from Tuesday, July 18, 2023 to Thursday, July 20, 2023, beginning at 6:30 PM or immediately following the Budget Workshop.

# Swim Lessons available for ages 6 months and up.

Session Dates:

July 11 - July 21 and July 25 - August 4

**IPAP** (Infant & Parent Aquatics Program): Six months to 3 years. Younger children will adjust to the water by learning skills such as placing the face in the water, flutter kicks and pre-floating skills. All parents are taught how to instruct their children and recognize any errors in their child's swimming technique. Children are required to wear swim diapers. Parents must be in the water with the child. Instructors will work at the skill level of each child regardless of abilities.

**Preschool Swim Lessons:** This class is for 4 and 5 year olds who are ready to learn introductory water skills, as well as beginner swimming skills. Students will learn to enter the pool properly, float, glide, and the basics of front crawl stroke.
